Congratulations to **Aquarium** for achieving **99.33%** attendance last week! Fantastic effort! Keep it up!


Our school attendance target is **97%** each week. Last week, our school attendance was **96.84%**




We are a nut-free school to ensure the safety of children and staff with nut allergies. We would like to remind you that many chocolate spreads, including popular brands, contain hazelnuts.



Luton

- You MUST apply before the closing date. High school applications 31 October, infant, primary and junior school applications 15 January
- It is vital that you read the 'How to apply for a school place' guide. This guide provides detailed information on the school admissions process and how school places are allocated. You can view it online at luton.gov.uk/school-admissions
- It is important to state three different schools. Consider realistic 'back-up' preferences. Look up your catchment area school and remember, if you want your catchment area school to be considered, you must include it as one of your preferences.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

CONSPIRACY THEORIES

Conspiracy theories are false or misleading beliefs that explain events as secret plots, often involving powerful groups. While once fringe, they are now more accessible through digital media, online influencers and because of algorithmic recommendations. The DfE guidance document, 'Keeping Children Safe in Education' (KCSIE) explicitly recognises conspiracy theories as potential content risks. This guide will help parents and educators understand the risks, spot the signs, and build children's resilience to conspiracy theories.

UNDERMINING TRUST

conspiracy theories can lead children and young people to distrust democratic lastitutions and British Volues, teachers, and everytheir own families and loved ones. This erosion of trust makes young people more yulnerable to extramist narratives by isolating them from reliable sources of information.

ONLINE ALGORITHM

sorial media platforms can often recommend behavioralist content. Once a child engages with one conspiracy-themed viges on post, algorithms push more of the same, thereby creating an echo chamber that can intensity their beliefs.

MENTAL HEALTH

Exposure to frightening conspiracy content, such as global plots, viruses, or government control, can fuel feelings of anxiety, paranoia, or hopelessness. For some young people, it can tringer prolonged distress or phases

GATEWAY TO LUE

Conspiracy theories on often overlap with extremist ideologies. Not alives into blome specific groups, such as politicians, scientists, or particular ethnic groups, can groom children in ways that foster hate, bigotry, and realization.

PEERS SEASE

relief in conspiracy theories can lead to solation or conflict at school. Children may truggle with peer relationships if they expres have beliefs of become distructful of others vilisagree, sometimes, confrontation can ever esult in a strengthening of the belief in the conspiracy theory.

ERODED CRITICAL

Young people influenced by conspiracies may reject evidence-based learning. This risks undermining their academic progress and weakening their ability to think critically, assess risks, or engage in healthy debate.

I WANT TO BELIEV

Advice for Parents & Educators

CREATE SAFE CONVERSATIONS

Don't mock or dismiss any questions that children and young people ask about conspiracy theories. Instead, create open, judgement-free spaces to talk. This strengthens trust and makes it more likely they will confide in you.

PROMOTE CRITICAL THINKING

Teach young people how to assess information critically. Encourage them to ask appropriate questions, such as: Who is telling me this? What evidence is there? What do other trusted sources say? Use real examples from current media to explain your answers and reasoning.

MONITOR DIGITAL BEHAVIOUR

Be aware of the content children are accessing, especially on platforms such as TikTok, YouTube, or Reddit. Use parental controls, but more importantly, maintain ongoing dialogue about online experiences and influencers.

REINFORCE RELIABLE SOURCES

Point children toward trustworthy and reliable sources of news and information in a variety of formats tailored to the young person's age Build habits of verifying facts using reliable sources, and teach them how to spot misleading content.
